

Amos P. Kennedy Jr., a letterpress printing artist and bookmaker, will join Randall K. Burkett, research curator of African American collections at Emory University's [Stuart A. Rose Manuscript, Archives, and Rare Book Library](#), for a Creativity Conversation on Tuesday, March 15, 2016, at 4 p.m. in the Teaching and Learning Studio of the Rose Library. The event is free and open to the public.

A 2015 United States Artists Glasgow Fellow in Crafts, Kennedy uses an old-fashioned letterpress printer to make posters with social, political and racial messages that reflect his views. The Rose Library, which collects his work, has a display of his posters in the corridor.

In celebration of Women's History Month, the Rose Library and the Woodruff Library will feature four exhibits that explore the works of women who have made significant societal contributions.

The "Celebrate Women's History" exhibit in the Rose Library features documents, photographs, and ephemera that highlight the accomplishments of both individual women and organized groups. "What Must Be Remembered" features beautiful photographs of Civil War-era artifacts and materials from the lives of African Americans. "Pearl Cleage: A Time for Reflection" and "Revealing Her Story: Documenting African America Women Intellectuals" highlight the contributions of nine artists, writers, musicians, teachers and activists.

Pictures in Nursing postcard exhibit explores cultural views of nursing

A traveling exhibit called "Pictures of Nursing: The Zwerdling Postcard Collection" is now on view at Emory University's Woodruff Health Sciences Center Library. Located near the main entrance of the library, the exhibit explores cultural views of nursing in the 20th century through the art form of postcards.

The six-panel exhibit highlights pieces from an archive of 2,588 postcards from around the world that depict nurses and the nursing profession. Produced between 1893 and 2011, the postcards shed light on cultural values and attitudes towards gender, class, race, and nationality at the times of their creation.
